

## 13: ESCAPING THE HIDDEN TRAP OF TEMPTATION "THE ESCAPE" 1 CORINTHIANS 10:13

### This Week's Core Competency

**Self-Control** – I have the power, through Christ, to control myself. Titus 2:11-13 For the grace of God that brings salvation has appeared to all men. 12 It teaches us to say "No" to ungodliness and worldly passions, and to live self-controlled, upright and godly lives in this present age, 13 while we wait for the blessed hope--the glorious appearing of our great God and Savior, Jesus Christ.

According to 1 Corinthians 10:5, God was not pleased with most of the Israelites that he saved from Egypt, supplied a leader, and sustained in the wilderness. In spite of what God had done for them, they set their hearts on evil things (v. 6). In verses 1-4 Paul points to five privileges they "all" enjoyed: 1) "Under the cloud" refers to God's guidance and protection (Nu 9:15-23; 14:14; Dt 1:33); 2) "Passed through the sea" refers to God's deliverance from Egypt (Ex 14:15-22); 3) "All baptized into Moses" refers to them "voluntarily and unconditionally placing themselves under the leadership of Moses" (David Prior, The Message of 1 Corinthians, TBST, 167); 4) "Ate the same spiritual food" refers to the manna God gave them daily (Ex 16:1-35); 5) "All drank the same spiritual drink" refers to water from the rock God gave them to quench their thirst (Ex 17:1-7; Nu 20:1-13). Despite all these blessings, the

Israelites failed their wilderness exam. When tests "seized" (cf. 1Co 10:13) them, rather than trust God who is faithful, they surrendered to temptation.

"Now these things occurred as examples to keep us from setting our hearts on evil things as they did" (v. 6), Paul says. In other words, unless we are careful, the history of Israel will be repeated in our own experience. Then he gives specific examples of Israel's failures. First, when Moses did not come down from the mountain after "forty days and forty nights" (Ex 24:18), rather than wait as he had instructed them, the Israelites grew tired of waiting. Having decided that their deliverer and leader had abandoned them, they took matters into their own hands and demanded Aaron make gods to go before them (32:1). When Moses did return, he found the camp engaged in idolatrous revelry (vv. 6, 19). In the words of one commentator, the people "did not exercise 'self-control' in the matter of idolatry and thereby failed to gain the prize" (Gordon D. Fee, The First Epistle to the Corinthians, NICNT, 443).

Second, while the people were staging for the conquest east of the Jordan in Shittim, Balaam managed to instigate a scheme to seduce Israel's men. Moabite women invited them to the sacrifices of their gods (Nu 25:1-2), which happened to involve engaging in sexual activity. Fertility rites (cf., Dt 23:17-18; 1Ki 14:22-24) were part and parcel of the regular worship of Baal (Nu 25:2). Rather than decline the invitation, the men accepted. "So serious was this breach of covenant, especially when Israel was on the threshold of the land of promise, that the LORD commanded Moses to take serious action" (v. 4) (Eugene H. Merrill, "Numbers," in *The Bible Knowledge Commentary: Old Testament*, 245-46);

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24,000 Israelites died in the aftermath (v. 9).

Third, as the Israelites journeyed around Edom, the people "spoke against God and against Moses" (Nu 21:4-5) accusing them both of bringing them into the desert to die. "There is no bread! There is no water! And we detest this miserable food!" (v. 5). Rather than persevere, they tested the LORD by accusing him, and he responded by sending venomous snakes among them (v. 6).

Finally, when Korah and 250 others rose up against Moses, accusing him of bringing them up "out of a land flowing with milk and honey" to kill them in the desert (Nu 16:1-2, 12-13), the LORD commanded they all gather in from of the Tent of Meeting. There he caused the earth to open up and swallow the offenders with their households and all their possessions (vv. 31-33). Rather than accept the LORD's judgment and learn from it, "the next day the whole Israelite community grumbled against Moses and Aaron. 'You have killed the LORD's people,' they said" (v. 41). And even though Aaron interceded for the people, 14,700 of them died.

The trials Israel faced in the wilderness with their accompanying temptations to idolatry, to sexual immorality, to test the LORD, and to grumble about their circumstances were all tests "common to man." Consequently Paul can rightly say, "These things happened to them as examples and were written down as warnings for us, on whom the fulfillment of the ages has come. So if you think you are standing firm, be careful that you don't fall" (1Co 10:11-12).



# **ENCOUNTER** – read God's word to put yourself in touch with him.

#### vv. 1-12

1 For I do not want you to be ignorant of the fact, brothers, that our forefathers were all under the cloud and that they all passed through the sea. 2 They were all baptized into Moses in the cloud and in the sea. 3 They all ate the same spiritual food 4 and drank the same spiritual drink; for they drank from the spiritual rock that accompanied them, and that rock was Christ. 5 Nevertheless, God was not pleased with most of them; their bodies were scattered over the desert. 6 Now these things occurred as examples to keep us from setting our hearts on evil things as they did. 7 Do not be idolaters, as some of them were; as it is written: "The people sat down to eat and drink and got up to indulge in pagan revelry." 8 We should not commit sexual immorality, as some of them did--and in one day twenty-three thousand of them died. 9 We should not test the Lord, as some of them did--and were killed by snakes. 10 And do not grumble, as some of them did--and were killed by the destroying angel. 11 These

things happened to them as examples and were written down as warnings for us, on whom the fulfillment of the ages has come. 12 So, if you think you are standing firm, be careful that you don't fall!

#### 1 Corinthians 10:13

13 No temptation has seized you except what is common to man. And God is faithful; he will not let you be tempted beyond what you can bear. But when you are tempted, he will also provide a way out so that you can stand up under it.

#### Cf., another translation

13 No testing has overtaken you that is not common to everyone. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tested beyond your strength, but with the testing he will also provide the way out so that you may be able to endure it. (NRSV)

# day **EXPLORE** – the answer to these questions to better understand what the passage means.

# day **B EXAMINE** – an explanation of the message to better understand the meaning of the passage.

1 Corinthians 10:13 is one of the better known verses in Paul's letter, "having served generations of Christians as a word of hope in times of difficulty" (Fee, 461). One author calls it "the great antidote to falling into sin through temptation" (W. Harold Mare, "1 Corinthians," in The Expositor's Bible Commentary, 10: 250). In verses 1-10 Paul describes how the Israelites were tested and tempted in the desert, explaining that what occurred to them and how they responded serve as examples that were written down as warnings for us (v. 11). Consequently, overly confident Christians who think themselves impervious to temptation should, in Paul's words, "be careful that you don't fall" (v. 12). Then "following hard on the heels of the warning to 'beware lest they fall' in v. 12, Paul reassures his Corinthian friends that they need not fall, at least not in the vicissitudes of Christian life common to all. God has already committed himself to them when it comes to ordinary human trials" (Fee, 460 italics added).

Paul asserts two things in verse 13. First, he asserts, "No temptation has seized you except what is common to man." Because the Greek noun peirasmos and related verb peiradzo can be translated temptation and tempt or testing and test respectively, our English translations differ. Paul has in mind the everyday challenges in life that test our faith and obedience. Every test is accompanied by the temptation to respond to it in unacceptable ways. As one commentator explains: "Tests in life are not bad; in fact, they can be divinely sent (James 1:2-4). The main issue is my response to a test. Do I respond in a way that looks to God to guide me through it? Do I trust him, or do I put him to the test? How do I respond to personal struggles in my life? Do I get angry? Do I seek to reassert my control (even when I know I cannot control events!)? Or do I rest in faith, look for

God's hand, and ask him what I should learn from what I am going through?" (Darrell L. Bock, *The NIV Application Commentary: Luke*, 131). For example, here are some trials that can "seize us" with the temptations that might accompany them. A serious illness might tempt us to question God's care. Undeserved criticism might tempt us to respond in anger. Suffering harm might tempt us to seek revenge. The promotion of a devious coworker might tempt us to question God's righteousness. Such tests and temptations are not unusual; they are "common to man" kinds of things faced by everyone.

Second, Paul asserts, "God is faithful." And then he explains that God's faithfulness is manifested in two ways. On the one hand, he will make sure that no test we face will be too hard for us. The apostle assures us, "He will not allow you to be tested beyond your power to remain firm" (GNT). On the other hand, he will make sure that in every test we face he will see us through. Paul says, "At the time you are put to the test, he will give you the strength to endure it, and so provide you with a way out." He does not assert that God will make sure that every trail we face comes with a way out of it, a way to escape unscathed. Instead, he assures us God will make sure we "can stand up under it."

What Paul says about our faithful God in 1 Corinthians 10:13 correlates nicely with what is said about him in other passages. In Romans 8:31-32 Paul asks, "If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare his own Son, but gave him up for us all-how will he not also, along with him, graciously give us all things?" And the author of the book of Hebrews adds, "Keep your lives free from the love of money and be content with what you have, because God has said, 'Never will I leave you; never will I forsake you'" (13:5).

# The Message of the Passage

When you're tempted to sin in response to tests in life, turn to your faithful God who will provide a way for you to withstand them.



Our desire is to not be merely hearers of the word, but doers of the word as James teaches in James 1:22. Try some of the challenges below to apply what you have learned this week.

# **STUDY** – the commentaries to answer the questions.

v. 11 *these things* 

See vv. 1-10, esp. vv. 6-10 (see Ex 32:6; Nu 25:1-9; Nu 21:4-6; Nu 16:45-49).

v. 11 **them** 

I.e., the Israelites in the wilderness.

v. 13 *temptation* Cf., "testing" (NRSV). "Gk. *peirasmos*, which, depending on context, can have the nuance either of temptation (='seduction to sin') or trial/test (which can lead to the former if one does not bear up under it)" (Fee, 460). What's more, both senses can be found in the same verse (cf., Jas 1:13, HCSB).

v. 13 *has seized* Cf., "has overtaken" (ESV, NKJV, NET, HCSB, NIV 2011). The testings that believers face are implicit in everyday life. We don't go after them; they come our way. These distinctively human tests are not unlike those faced by the Israelites in the wilderness (vv. 6-10).

v. 13 *common to man* Cf., "The temptations in your life are no different from what others experience" (NLT); "No trial has overtaken you that is not faced by others" (NET). "The temptations that come to the Christian are those all human beings face" (Mare, 250). "The trials we face are only normal problems (cf. also 2:4, 13; 4:3; Rom. 4:19; James 3:7; 1 Pet. 2:13)" (Dan Mitchell, *The Book of 1 Corinthians*, TCBC, 145).

v. 13 *faithful* When it comes to the trials common to this human life, "God is faithful;" he can be counted on for help. Paul's confidence is rooted in motifs depicting God in the OT. "The God of Israel was a faithful God, always reliable, always true to himself, who could therefore be counted on to fulfill all his promises (Deut. 7:9; Ps. 144:13)" (Fee, 44). God helps those facing testing in two ways. "First, God has pledged himself 'not to let you be tested beyond what you can bear.' This, of course, speaks not only to the fact of God's prior activity in behalf of his people, Paul's emphasis, but also to the fact that they will be called upon to endure. They must be prepared for 'a long obedience in the same direction.' In his faithfulness God is pledge not to allow what is beyond that endurance. Second, and as the other side of the same coin, 'when you are tempted, he will also provide the way out (or make an end) so that you can stand up under it'" (Fee, 461).

v. 13 *way out* Cf., "At the time you are put to the test, he will give you the strength to endure it, and so provide you with a way out" (GNT). "This sounds like a contradiction in terms: finding 'the way out' so that you 'continue to bear it.' But the problem lies only in the less-than-precise wording. There is a 'way out of,' or 'end to,' whatever testing one may undergo; but that is to be seen from the divine perspective. One may yet have to endure before the 'end' is realized. In any case, one may trust the faithful God to provide the 'end' to a test that he has not necessarily originated, but that he has allowed" (461). "God will 'provide the way of escape' (v. 13). In early Greek, this was a nautical term that had the sense of a landing place. The idea is not that God will enable us to escape temptation, but that He will enable us to land safely on the other side victorious. Often the only escape is 'to endure' (cf. James 1:12 but also 1 Cor. 6:7)" (Mitchell, 145).

I may have failed this one but God will provide a way out the next time, and in His strength -I will take it!
