

### "AFTER YOU, ME FIRST" MATTHEW 3:13-17

### This Week's Core Competency

**Church** – I believe the church is God's primary way to accomplish His purposes on earth today. Ephesians 4:15-16 Instead, speaking the truth in love, we will in all things grow up into him who is the Head, that is, Christ. From him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work.

Most of us look back on the day of our baptism with great joy. Whether it was during a special service, in the presence of family and friends, or perhaps performed in the Jordan River itself, the day we took that step of obedience to identify ourselves with Christ's life, death and resurrection will forever be etched in our mind. I remember my baptism. Holly and I were actually baptized together. Both of us received Christ many years prior yet it was almost a year to the day before we were baptized that God finally stirred our affections to live a life in true honor of him. We still have the pictures that were taken and look back upon that day with the greatest of fondness.

While there is no question that the day of our baptism stands out as one of the most significant and memorable days of our life, I recently became struck by the significance that the God's word and even the early church places upon the impact one's individual baptism has upon the corporate body, Christ's church. "In 1 Corinthians 12:13, [Paul] regards baptism as the means of initiation into one body, i.e. the Christian community." (Donald Guthrie, *New Testament Theology*, 755). While Paul is ultimately referring to the spiritual baptism we received by the Holy Spirit at our conversion, he is trying to communicate from a practical standpoint of the unity (marked outwardly by the ordinance of water baptism) that should exist within the collective body of Christ.

While even the best actions of the early church can't be deemed as "infallible," I was captivated to note the import that it placed on baptism. If a person desired to become a part of the Jerusalem church, that one was required to be discipled by a church leader. This season of discipleship could take as long as a year (or more!). Once the individual demonstrated a clear understanding of Christian truth and were living a fruitful life unto the Lord, a time would be dedicated to traverse to the Jordan to be baptized. Immediately following this ceremony, the entire church would convene. The new "members" of the church would partake of the communion elements for the very first time. Up until that moment, prospects seeking to become a part of this Christian community were not allowed to remain in the worship service while worshippers took the communion elements. For them, water baptism served as a rite of passage into the unbridled fellowship within the community of believers. (See further Justo Gonzalez, The Story of Christianity, vol. 1, Harper Collins Press).

## A Situation for Discussion

Over the past few months, you've had the opportunity to talk with your neighbor Bob about a variety of spiritual topics such as the authority of the Bible, spiritual gifts and even the gospel message of Christ's death and resurrection. Yet last night Bob called with a question that you didn't quite know how to answer. "Remember how we talked a while back con't pg. 2

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about Jesus being without sin? You know, born of a virgin and all. Well, I'm reading here that John the Baptist was baptizing people because of their sin against God. Then I read where Jesus comes and gets baptized by John too! So what gives?



# **ENCOUNTER** – read God's word to put yourself in touch with him.

#### Matthew 3:13-17

13Then Jesus came from Galilee to the Jordan to be baptized by John. 14But John tried to deter him, saying, "I need to be baptized by you, and do you come to me?" 15Jesus replied, "Let it be so now; it is proper for us to do this to fulfill all righteousness." Then John consented. 16As soon as Jesus was baptized, he went up out of the water. At that moment heaven was opened, and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and lighting on him. 17And a voice from heaven said, "This is my Son, whom I love; with him I am well pleased." (NIV(c)1984)

#### Cf. John 1:29-34

29The next day John saw Jesus coming toward him and said, "Look, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world! 30This is the one I meant when I said, 'A man who comes after me has surpassed me because he was before me.' 31I myself did not know him, but the reason I came baptizing with water was that he might be revealed to Israel." 32Then John gave this testimony: "I saw the Spirit come down from heaven as a dove and remain on him. 33I would not have known him, except that the one who sent me to baptize with water told me, 'The man on whom you see the Spirit come down and remain is he who will baptize with the Holy Spirit.' 34I have seen and I testify that this is the Son of God."

# day 2 **EXPLORE** – the answer to these questions to better understand what the passage means.

understand what the passage means.
<b>Consult the explanation of the message and the notes to follow if you need help.</b> 1. Read John's recording of Jesus' baptism (1:29-34). What features of his are distinct from that of Matthew's account? How does reading both accounts enhance your understanding of this story?
2. What was John's initial response to the prospect of baptizing Jesus? Why do you think he responded in this way? (Consider reading vv. 1-12)
3. Identify three distinct elements from Jesus' response back to John in v. 15.
4. In what sense do you think John's baptism of Jesus was to "fulfill all righteousness"?
5. What contrasting actions do you see in v. 16?
6. What do you make of the Spirit's descent upon Jesus?
7. What significance do you ascribe to the message given from heaven?

8. In what sense can we identify this as a Trinitarian passage?

9. Discussion: Playing off the word "identification," contrast Christ's baptism with believer's baptism.

# day **B EXAMINE** – an explanation of its message to clarify your understanding of the passage.

Given that the baptism of Jesus is recorded in all four Gospels (Mt 3:13-17; Mk 1:9-11; Lk 3:21-22; Jn 1:29-34), it goes without saying that this event marks a significant point in the life of our Savior. John the Baptist speaks of his mission to officiate baptisms of repentance (Mk 1:4) by stating "the reason I came baptizing with water was that [the Messiah] might be revealed to Israel" (Jn 1:31). This speaks to a desired result of Christ's baptism, yet it doesn't speak to the necessity of Jesus' baptism. (After all, God could have made Israel's messiah known to them in any number of ways.)

Jesus provides John with a direct response as to the need for his baptism; to a) take place and b) be conducted by John. "It is proper for us to do this to fulfill all righteousness" (Mt 3:15; Italics added). "To fulfill all righteousness" means to complete everything that forms part of a relationship of obedience to God. In doing so, Jesus identifies with and endorses John's ministry as divinely ordained and his message as one to be heeded" (Craig L. Blomberg, Matthew, NAC, 81). While Jesus' baptism marked the beginning of the end of John's ministry, "Jesus seems to be suggesting here a need to identify with John's ministry and call to the nation before he goes out to complete what John had started" (Darrell Bock, Jesus According to Scriptures, 87).

Others speak of the anointing Jesus received at his baptism. Acts 10:37-38 states "after the baptism that John preached—how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and power." After discussing reflections of Christ's anointing from the standpoint of numerous early church fathers, Catholic priest Raniero Cantalamessa comments, "These theologians of the earliest times were not therefore unaware of the Holy Spirit's presence in Jesus from the moment of his human birth; they did however attribute a different and decisive significance to the solemn anointing received by Jesus in the Jordan to mark the beginning of his messianic mission. According to some of them, just as at the incarnation the Word had become 'Jesus,' so at his baptismal anointing he had become 'Christ,' that is to say God's Anointed One, the Messiah" (Raniero Cantalamessa, The Holy Spirit in the Life of Christ, 6). "He is called Christ because [he was] anointed with the Holy Spirit by the Father." (Tertullian, De baptismo, 7.1).

And last but certainly not least there is the import of two aspects of identification that take place at Jesus' baptism. First, in order for his sacrificial death to legitimately atone for our sins, Jesus had to fully "share in [our] humanity . . . so that by his death he might destroy . . . the devil" (Heb 2:14, 17). Via his baptism, Jesus further identified himself with sin-stricken humanity (Isa 53:11-12) in need of, not only repentance but, a Savior. Second, our text concludes with God the Father's identification of Jesus as his one and only divine Son and Servant (cf. Ps 2:7 and Is 42:1-2). All of these aspects and more serve notice that Jesus' baptism was one of the most significant moments in human history.

## The Message of the Passage

Through his baptism, Jesus validated John's ministry, identified himself with fallen humanity, was anointed by the Holy Spirit for his messianic mission and was identified by the Father as his uniquely beloved Son.

# day **EMBRACE** – how God spoke to you through his word.

# **notes N STUDY** – the commentaries to answer the questions.

v. 13 *to the Jordan* "The precise location of Jesus' baptism is disputed. The traditional site is Qasar el-Yahud on the western bank of the Jordan River. However, the scene might instead be identified with "Bethany across [i.e., on the eastern side of] the Jordan" as noted in John 1:28 (*ESV Study Bible*, note on Matthew 3:13).

v. 13 *baptized* (Gk - *baptizo*) In *practice*, the act of being baptized means to "dip," "immerse," or "submerge." Yet, the *purpose* of baptism serves as "a sacred rite that signifies purification, initiation, or identification of an individual with a leader, group or teaching" (*Nelson Study Bible*, NKJV, 1639). "If [the] Messiah were to provide righteousness for sinners, He must be identified with sinners. It was therefore in the will of God for Him to be baptized by John in order to be identified (the real meaning of the word "baptized") with sinners" (Louis A. Barbieri, "Matthew" in the *Bible Knowledge Commentary: New Testament*, 25).

v. 14 *deter* Cf., "forbade" (KJV); "kept objecting" (CEV); "prevent" (NASB); "tried to prevent" (NKJV); "would have prevented" (ESV). Most likely, John's initial objection to Jesus' request to be baptized was not rooted in the fact that Jesus was without sin. While John knew the Messiah would "take away the sins of the world" (Jn 1:29), he would likely not have had a then present understanding of the *sinlessness* of the Christ. Rather, John's resistance to baptize Jesus was likely a response of humility, knowing that the One who has now come is "so much greater that I am not even worthy to be his slave" (Mk 1:7; NLT).

v. 15 *fulfill all righteousness* Christ's baptism did not in and of itself "fulfill *all* righteousness" (Italics added). Rather, his baptism, which essentially inaugurated his public ministry, was necessary for the fulfillment of all righteousness to one day be achieved - at the Cross (cf. Phil 2:8). "Jesus' baptism was an act of identification with sinners *ab extra*, from outside the realm of sin altogether" Robert Culver, *Systematic Theology*, 525). In Matthew, "righteousness means doing God's will [walking obediently before Him]. From the baptism to the crucifixion, from the beginning to the end of his public ministry, Jesus fulfilled all righteousness" (David K. Lowery, "Matthew" in *The Bible Knowledge Key Word Study: The Gospels*, 46).

v. 16 **like a dove** Lit., "as if." Throughout history, many have sought to postulate the symbolic significance in using "the dove" as a figure of speech for the Holy Spirit's descent. Yet the most likely option seems to be in similarities with the pre-Creation text of Ge 1:2a - "and the Spirit of God was hovering ("watching") over the face of waters." (NKJV, ESV; See also Dt 32:11). Regarding Ge 1:2 one commentator notes that while the earth is still formless "all is kept in check and under the control of the Spirit of God" (Victor P. Hamilton, *The Book of Genesis Chapters 1-17*, 115). Whereas Ge 1:2 deals with God's original creation of the heavens and the earth, Jesus' ministry, beginning at his baptism, deals with our redemption and ultimately the creation of a new heaven and new earth (Re 21:1). As we observe the life of Christ in the Gospels, we begin to see just how significant the Holy Spirit's role is in Christ's ministry (Mt 4:1, 12:28; Lk 4:1, 4:14, 17-18 (cf. Is 42:1, 61:1-2); See also Ac 10:38).

v. 17 *voice* "The heavenly voice cites excerpts of Ps 2:7 and Isa 42:1. Both texts were taken as messianic by important segments of pre-Christian Judaism. Together [these sources] point out Jesus' role as both divine Son and Suffering Servant, a crucial combination for interpreting Jesus' self-understanding and mission" (Blomberg, 82).

v. 17 *whom I love* Lit., my "beloved" Son; inherently dear. "The definite article [adds] to the sense of uniqueness to the love the Father has for His only begotten Son (Matt 12:18, 17:5)" (Spiros Zodhiates, *Matthew*, 24).

# Connect the **FAMILY**.

### **Experience** it!

Experience scripture through the activity-based learning exercise. Dinner is a perfect time to engage the family.

Jesus spent his entire life doing what his heavenly father wanted him to do. Name a few of the things he did to obey God. Read Matthew 3:13-17. Although some say he didn't have to be baptized since he never sinned, Jesus chose to as a way to please God. Getting baptized is something God wants you to do, also. Father, I pray will know there is one body and one Spirit–just as she was called to one hope when she was called–one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all. Eph 4:4-6
